





# The largest indoor recreation facility between Sacramento and Portland will soon open in Medford!

The Rogue Credit Union Community Complex ("Rogue X") is a \$76 million, 140,000-square foot recreation facility owned, maintained and managed by the City of Medford. The Rogue X contains a 76,000-square foot multi-purpose event center, an indoor recreation pool featuring two water slides, a 13-lane indoor competition pool, classrooms, an outdoor seasonal splashpad, and a food truck pod.

The Rogue X is situated in the heart of Howard Memorial Sports Park, a 54-acre community park in west Medford along Rossanley Drive and Ross Lane. When complete, the park will contain multiple sports fields and a playground.

The concept of an event center and an aquatics facility under a single roof received City Council approval in 2018, and financing was approved in July 2020. Construction began in April 2022; the Rogue X is set to open to the public in January 2024.

Rogue Credit Union agreed to a 10-year, \$2.145 million facility namingrights agreement. Proceeds help offset operational costs and also provide water safety classes to all fourth-graders in the Medford School District.






The Rogue X will be a mecca for swim lessons, trade shows, youth and adult sports leagues and tournaments, dance classes, and much more! # Harmonious Milestones: Music Activities to Support Your Child's Development

ognitive development. Below are some musical activities for facilitating the achievement of developmental milestones at different stages of childhood:

### **Infancy (0-12 months):**

- Cognitive Development: Play instrumental music with repetitive patterns.
   Encourage hand-eye coordination by playing along with small baby-safe musical instruments like shakers or bells.
- Auditory Development: Sing gentle lullabies and songs to soothe your baby. Your baby loves your voice. Listening to you sing also strengthens your bond and comforts your baby.
- Motor Skills: Engage in baby exercise while singing or listening to music.
  This can include tummy time, offering toys or other objects for your baby
  to reach for and grasp, and encouraging your baby to roll over from back
  to tummy and vice versa to strengthen core muscles.

### **Toddlerhood (1-3 years):**

- Coordination and Language Skills: Play simple singing games like "Ring Around the Rosie" or "Head, Shoulders, Knees, and Toes." These songs incorporate both a variety of movements requiring coordination and repetitive use of words which encourages vocabulary development.
- Listening and Vocal Skills: Encourage your child to listen to animal sounds or different musical instruments and imitate them vocally.
- Motor Skills and Coordination: Incorporate movement into music, such as dancing or clapping to the beat to develop gross motor skills. Use small musical instruments like shakers or tambourines to develop fine motor skills and hand-eye coordination.

### **Preschool Age:**

• Cultural and Social Awareness: Listen to, move to, and discuss the music of different places and peoples.



- Cognitive Skills:. Sing songs with numbers, colors, and shapes to introduce these concepts while enhancing memory, attention, and problem-solving skills.
- Social Skills: Sing and play musical games in groups or join an early childhood music class to promote social interaction, cooperation, and turn-taking.
- Emotional Regulation: Sing songs with your child to help them express their emotions and cope with stress or anxiety. Listen to calming music which will help your child to self sooth.

### **Elementary School Age:**

- Academic Skills: Provide music lessons for your child. Numerous studies have shown that students who learn to play an instrument tend to perform better in subjects like math and science.
- Creativity: Music encourages creativity and imagination. Participation in music activities can help your child develop enhanced creative thinking
- Self-Expression: Music enables the expression of feelings through sound, which can help your child understand and convey their emotions.

### Adolescence:

 Identity and Self-Expression: Teenagers can use music as a means to express their identity and connect with friends who share their musical tastes. Learning to play an instrument often leads to songwriting or playing




in a band which are powerful outlets for self-expression.

- Emotional Well-being: Music can be a source of emotional support during the challenging teenage years, helping adolescents cope with stress, anxiety, and mood swings.
- Self-Confidence and Self-Esteem: The achievement experienced when playing and performing on an instrument can boost a teenager's confidence and self-esteem.

It's important to note that the benefits of music on developmental milestones can vary from person to person. The way in which music is introduced and integrated into a child's life plays a significant role in determining its impact.

Encourage active participation in music, provide a wide range of musical experiences, foster a positive and supportive environment, and music will enhance your child's development and bring joy to their world for a lifetime.







# More Treats! Less Tricks!

Fall is beginning to make its appearance in the valley. Fall means a lot of things to a lot of people but to children it means Halloween and trick or treating. Halloween can be a time for fun but can also be a challenging time to keep kids safe.



Here are a few tips to help keep the holiday fun:

- 1. Do not allow your children to go trick or treating without a responsible adult.
- 2. Make sure that your trick or treaters have either reflective gear on or carrying a flashlight. It is hard to see little people dressed up in black Halloween gear at night.
- 3. Make sure to only trick or treat at houses that have a porch light on. They are signaling they are prepared to give you a treat.
- 4. Make sure that your trick or treaters know the rules about whose house they may go inside and whose house is off limits. It is not a good idea for children to go into houses of people they do not know.
- 5. Do not allow your children to eat candy or treats that have already been opened or appear to have been tampered with in any way.

This is also a great opportunity to go over the safety rules for crossing the street such as crossing only at the corner, making contact with drivers before crossing in front of their car and always stay on sidewalks or designated paths. Make sure that your trick or treaters are paying attention to cars that may be backing out of or turning into driveways. Also make sure to practice with your child saying NO! in a loud voice if someone tries to get them to go in their car or off the designated paths.

However, the safest thing is to take the opportunity to walk through the neighborhood with your child while they trick or treat. Great opportunity for exercise for you and is the best option to keep your child safe.

# As the seasons change, so do fire and life hazards. . .

As cooler weather sinks in, our activities change and we spend more time indoors. Here are some seasonal tips to help protect you and those around you:

Cooking equipment is the leading cause of home fires and fire injuries, causing 47% of home fires that result in 20% of the home fire deaths and 45% of the injuries.

- •Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol, do not use the stove or stovetop.
- •Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, boiling, or broiling food.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the kitchen while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire—oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains—away from your stovetop.
- •Make a safety plan with your family in case of emergency
- •Have a fire extinguisher in good working order.



- •Interestingly, candles account for only 2% of home fires, despite their reputation. Use caution with candles, however, and never leave them unattended
- Working smoke alarms are key to early notification of a fire, especially at night when people are sleeping. Replace smoke alarms every 10 years. Test them a couple of times a year.
- If you have a fuel-burning device in your home, like a woodstove or gas furnace, a carbon monoxide (CO) alarm is essential. CO gas can leak from faulty equipment, and is called the "silent killer" because it is odorless and colorless. CO gas in the home can cause illness and death over time.
- Winter is a good time to prepare for next fire season. Trim brush and trees and clean up around your home to create defensible space.
- With a little common sense and foresight, we can all enjoy a safe and healthy winter season!
